In this pdf, you'll get a ECPE vocabulary quiz with 30 questions designed to feel just like the real exam. The ECPE doesn't ask direct questions like "choose the synonym" or "find the meaning." Instead, it uses **fill-in-the-blank** questions. That means you need to know not just what a word means, but how it fits naturally in a sentence.

The vocabulary used in the ECPE is at the **C2 level** of the CEFR scale, which is quite advanced. So you can't expect to score well just by memorizing definitions—you need to understand usage and tone, too.
